

## Official Club Ride outs in December

Nine riders attended on what was a pretty dismal day, with drizzle in the air at the start, and of course the accompanying usual wet roads. We (the standby Drivers) were called out at 8pm the night before the ride by National Highways, in order to go gritting the motorway network, so part of the pre-ride debrief HAD to include the warning of some possible Low Temperature microclimates still lingering about in the rural sections.

The inclement weather meant that this was very sensibly rescheduled to Wed. 21<sup>st</sup>


Living the dream with CWAM on a ride that had a bit of everything and was all the better for it. Thanks to all who joined me, we must visit Bicester Bean again in 2023.

Below is some advice from Rapid Training who I've been out with, probably the best trainers in the UK.... Follow them on Facebook if you want to, (if you have it) they do have some riding advice which differs from IAM but they are next level, more Police style riding. The clue is in the name!

You may have noticed the turn in the weather, but if you're on a bike, here's how to stay safe!

 $\ensuremath{\ast}$  Read the road early: more time to react, avoids abrupt changes in speed and direction

 $\ensuremath{\ast}$  Traction is everything: optimise it with silky smooth inputs when changing speed or direction

\* Look for grippiest sections of road and use where they add advantage


 $\ast$  Straighten lines where you can to reduce lean, and use body position to reduce lean angle where necessary

 $\ast$  Stay warm: cold affects your concentration and physical reactions, consider heated kit, and thermal layers reduce bulk.

 $\ensuremath{\ast}$  Check forecast and consider what it means to your chosen route. Have a plan B if weather deteriorates.

\* Carry visor cleaner: they can get covered in dirt and grime and hinder visibility

We have just passed the season of 'While Shepherds watched their flocks by night' and as mentioned in the last Newsletter, the committee has decided that it would also be a good idea, for bikers to watch over their bikes on Club Sundays.

It fell on Nick Lilley to implement it at the outset and I did one to see what was involved. Nick kept saying "we really need someone to step forward and organise this". (Funnily enough, he always seemed to be looking directly at me when he said it. So I thought "Maybe he's trying to tell me something" Ed.)

Taking the hint, I wrote this article..... My first thought is that most of the members who are there on Sundays have an important job to do. Observers with their associates for check rides, or Committee members who should make themselves available to chat to members over a coffee.

So, even though it was their idea, let's rule all of the committee out for a start! The rest are made up of members just there to socialise and hoping to go out on an impromptu ride-out. **You are my target audience**!

Andy Spencer explained that the bikes only need watching over from 09:00 until 09:45, when most check rides and impromptu ride-outs start setting off (hence plenty of activity in the car park), **so the person on guard duty will not miss the ride-out!** 

Analysing the situation further, there are approximately **25** club Sundays per year, so we only need between **12** to **25** volunteers to offer to do a stint, some once, some maybe a couple of times, during the year.

So, just **45** minutes out of your life per year. Recall this quote from Mark Lunt's annual address..... *It's your club. There are things that need doing......* 

I was so moved by this other quote from Mark .......... What better way could CWAM celebrate the start of the New Year than by having a record turnout for Club Sunday on 8th. Jan, that I thought "If there is a record turnout, thousands of pounds

worth more in bikes will need to be protected so I'd better offer to cover this one as well"  $\sim$  being the conscientious member that I am.

I wasn't sure how it could be organised, moving forward, but how about this for a start? If you want to commit to doing one, let us know on Facebook, over a month in advance. However, what about the multitude of you without Facebook? We know you wouldn't want to miss out on doing your bit 'giving something back to the club', so let one of the committee members know at one of our events, then I can put it in the Newsletter Events diary to remind you. Simple enough ~ let's see if it works.

I optimistically ended my piece with..... If you have better idea, or want to step forward and organise it yourself, please do!!!
