A Steam Powered Rocket Bike

Steam-powered rocket bike propels 'daredevil grandad' to world speed record

Graham Sykes accelerates on the Force of Nature steam-powered rocket bike

Garden shed engineering might conjure images of flimsy birdfeeders, maybe even wooden furniture for the more ambitious. For Graham Sykes, a precision engineer and 'daredevil grandad' from Bedale, North Yorkshire, it means designing and building a steam-powered rocket bike.

The <u>Force of Nature</u>, as the bike is known, hit top speeds of roughly 290km/h (180mph) at Elvington Speed Week in May. Controlled by Sykes, it managed 263.6km/h (163.8mph) in just 3.87 seconds over one-eighth of a mile, breaking the world speed record for a steam-powered motorcycle – and it is yet to reach full power, Sykes claimed. An airless tyre, using memory alloys as the load bearing component, is the claim of the Los Angeles based SMART Tire Company. It's been working with NASA to develop a tyre from the experience of an exploration vehicle used on the Moon. The result is the SMART (Shape Memory Alloy Radial Technology) which has a nonpneumatic tyre shape comprising a mesh or radial bands, mainly of the memory alloy NiTinol. Memory alloys are capable of "undergoing phase transitions at the molecular level with significant reversible strain (up to 10%) an order of magnitude more than ordinary materials." In other words, it can deform significantly and will always spring back into shape - SMART claims the result is has the elastic qualities

FEMA considers a proper and balanced driving licence directive as one of the most important instruments for road safety. It should also ensure that it facilitates our citizens in mobility needs. A good driving license system enables citizens of all ages in using their own transport modes to participate in the society, go to school or work and to visit relatives and friends where walking, cycling or public transport are not the best

Should any runs be planned to Wales, this goes a long way to explaining the change in speed limits.


There seems to be some significant confusion here in Wales ahead of tomorrow's Speed Limit change and so, I thought I would help by briefly explaining how the change works so that there can be no confusion:

Any roads that were previously 30 will now be 20 apart from the roads that aren't going to be 20, which will still remain as 30. When you see street lights you have to assume that the roads will be 20 even if the signs still say 30 because despite the signs saying 30, the roads could be 20, apart from, of course, the roads (as explained above) which will remain 30 despite them being 20. It's also important to remember that there will still be a number of roads which despite them having streetlights will not be 20, and in these cases they could be 30, 40, 50, 60 or even 70, however, always bear in mind that even if the signs on these roads still state 30 they could, of course, be 20 unless they are one of the roads that have been designated 30, in which case the 20 restriction will not apply.


